Every day I went to this lunch place in Summertown, Taylors. It is an inexpensive sandwich shop two bus stops away from Logan House. This gourmet sandwich shop in the center of Summertown and in the city center has a few types of food. They have

premade/reheated sandwiches, make your own sandwiches and pasta as well. For the 4-5 weeks I went with a make your own sandwich. My sandwich consisted of Chicken Bacon spread, cheddar cheese, cucumber, red onions, Jalapeno peppers, olive oil, salt and pepper on a plain baguette. When I say that this is one of the best sandwiches I have ever had, I mean it. The sandwich tasted like subway on steroids. Last week, the person working knew my order off the top of her head. "My favorite customer" she would say. The sandwiches, smoothies and other food there are not expensive either.
